


Percent Who Worry a Great Deal




Belief about Effects of Global Warming




View on the Cause of Global Warming





Yale's Six Americas 2014-2017





The Alarmed (The Convinced)

- "They are very certain global warming is occurring, understand that it is human-caused and harmful
- Strongly support societal action to reduce the threat.
- They discuss the issue more often, seek more information about it, and are more likely to act as global warming opinion leaders than other segments.
- They are the most likely of the six groups to have engaged in political activism on the issue, although only about a quarter have done so."




"The Concerned"

- Concerned about global warming but not active on the issue, and might be unconvinced we can solve the climate crisis.
- From Six Americas: "moderately certain that global warming is occurring, harmful and human caused;
- . . .View global warming as a threat to other nations and future generations, but not as a personal threat or a threat to their community.
- They support societal action on climate change, but are unlikely to have engaged in political action."
- The largest audience segment is the Concerned (29% nationally)









Favor Regulating Carbon as a Pollutant

Koch Industries: Secretly Funding the Climate Denial Machine

The Koch Brothers have sent at least \$79,048,951 to groups denying climate change science since 1997.

Greenpeace uses 1997 as a benchmark year due to increased coordinated backlash against global climate negotiations leading to the Kyoto Protocol of 1998. We define climate change denial as "anyone who is obstructing, delaying or trying to derail policy steps that are in line with the scientific consensus that says we need to take rapid steps to decarbonize the economy of."







Other Findings from Media Matters


- ABC, CBS, NBC, And Fox Failed To Discuss Climate-Related Ramifications Of A Clinton Or Trump Presidency Until After The Election.
- Tyndall Report: No climate coverage in 2016 until October 25,
- Not one single segment on link to national security
- PBS only network to address economic impacts of CC
- Rarely address climate change impacts public health
- Nieman: Five largest newspapers coverage decreased from ave. 400 stories a month 2007 to less than half 2012; 300 a month 2016-2018





Fossil Fuel Resistance - Grassroots Uprising

- Key turning point
 - Enormous skepticism at the start, but many fossil fuel projects now defeated and withdrawn
 - ✓ Moratorium on coal leasing; big regional federal shifts
- Keep it in the Ground/Break Free Momentum
 - ✓ Fighting natural gas, oil by rail, coal terminals—a lot to resist and a lot of momentum
- Broad-based Resistance
 - ✓ Tribes, Communities of Color, youth, labor
 - Many local businesses, elected officials, health professionals, other constituencies self-organizing


